Director's Corner

“Faith is a team sport,” Fr. Bill Byrne declared in a recent daily WTOG radio reflection from the Archdiocese of Washington.

Here it is March, the start of Lent, daylight-saving time, spring and college basketball's March Madness tournament. Fr. Bill got me thinking about my past Lenten journeys through music and basketball. “I try to live my faith through music, and basketball is my favorite team sport,” I reasoned. Like a frenetic layup drive to the basket, I conjured up a connection through a timeline.

1959: Weekday after-school practice included those dreaded, hand-numbering scales and arpeggios up and down the living room piano keyboard. All the while, my neighborhood buds dribbled up and down the basketball court across the street within 3-point range of my front porch. They could

hear the piano; I could hear the bouncing ball. My plan was to be out there with them; God had another plan.


1966: By now, all those years of disciplined piano and organ practice had elevated me into positions of parish assistant organist and boys' choir accompanist. That same hard-scrabble tenacity got me onto the high-school varsity basketball team, the year the Portsmouth Catholic Saints won the state championship! I also gained the respect of my neighborhood hoopsters: In pickup games, they'd chant “Liberace” whenever I'd score a basket or snatch a rebound from the rim, a street-wise connect of my hoop skills to that then-piano phenom.

1983: I had packed away hymnals and other music books to concentrate on all-consuming family and career priorities. But I carved out time to coach my then-9- and 10-year-old sons in community-league basketball. I named the team after the North Carolina State Wolfpack, 1983 college basketball champions. I would lead my

young hoopsters in a frenetic litany: “Whaddaya got!?” I'd yell. “Pack power!” they'd shout back. “Whaddaya got?” “Pack power!” “Whaddaya gonna do?” “Pack attack! Go Wolfpack!” Within a few seasons, we too would win a championship.

2014: I had resumed all aspects of liturgical music and reduced family basketball to attending grandsons' youth league games. One choir rehearsal night I found myself comparing the finer points of team basketball play to team choir singing: “Everyone on the court has an important role; so to does every choir member. Check. It starts

with the coach/director and flows through the players/members. Check. Star players and vocal soloists have special roles. Check. Just like there's team-play fluidity, there's choir-molded sound. Check.” Aside from a few bizarre stares, my points seemed to be well-taken.



Thanks to Fr. Bill Byrne for inspiring me to conjure up a kinship between music in our faith and a celebrated team sport – both during the Lenten season.

Oh, one last dot to connect: Fr. Bill pastors Our Lady of Mercy parish in Potomac, MD, site of our chapters' upcoming Saturday March 30 workshop entitled *Psalms, Canticles and Antiphons: Singing the Word of God*. Southern Maryland Gathering 2019



The musicians who gathered on **January 26** for the Annual Southern Maryland Gathering identified themselves as directors, cantors/psalmists, accompanists, choir and ensemble singers. No matter their specific titles, however, everyone laid claim to being a liturgical minister. And that became the focus of the day: How does our ministry serve the people in our assemblies?

Discussion included:

- Are we following the basic guidelines found in the 2007 US Bishops' document, *Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship*?
- Do we honor the principle of progressive solemnity?
- What Mass settings are being used in local parishes? Settings most often mentioned were the Chant Mass, *Mass of Christ the Savior* (Dan Schutte), and *Mass of Renewal* (Curtis Stephan).

Mass of Creation (Marty Haugen), *Heritage Mass* (Owen Alstott) and *Mass of Wisdom* (Steve Janco) are also being used.

- How do we evaluate the music we ask the assembly to sing?
- Do our parishes have a stable repertoire, especially for special seasons?
- Does the assembly know the sound of its voice (best recognized through a cappella singing)? To demonstrate this point, we sang – without accompaniment – the *Mass of Christ the Savior* and two dozen hymns/songs found in most hymnals.

When asked what other concerns attendees had, all agreed that recruiting new members and getting everyone to regular rehearsals (on time) topped the list. Topics for next year?

Introductions, Modulations, and Cadences


