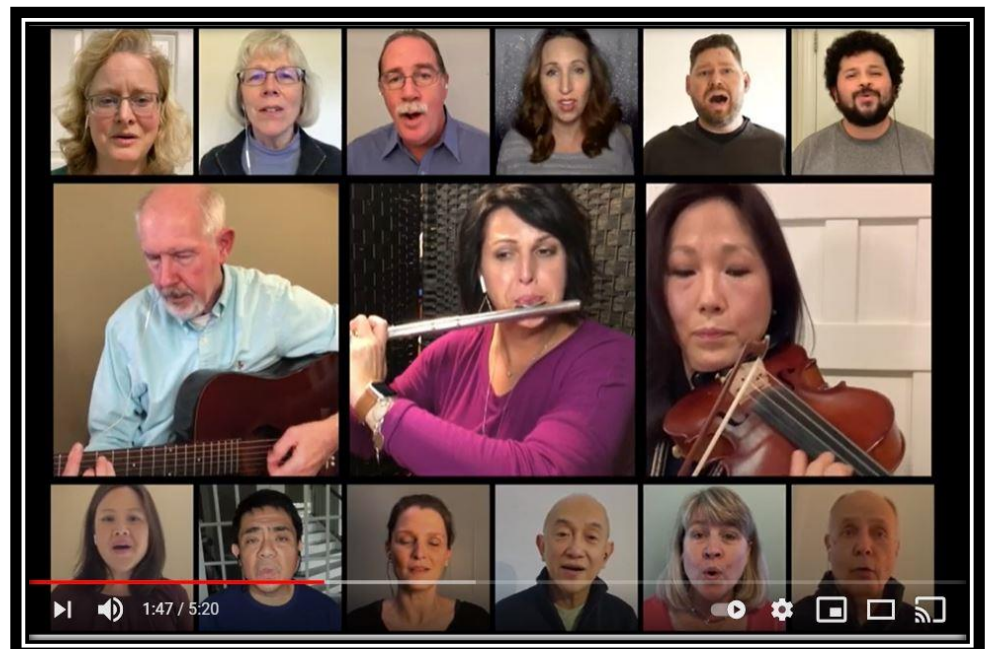

DIRECTOR'S CORNER



We are now a month into 2021 and it seems 2020 is still holding on. The pandemic continues (though some hope is here in form of the vaccines), our nation stands in division and chaos, we struggle with injustices; and yet, the Church calls us to prayer:

We hear those words from the prophet Joel each Ash Wednesday - "Even now." Even now, pray and sing. Even now, a year into a global pandemic, pray and sing. Even now, amid political turmoil, pray and sing. Even now, when others mock you or argue with you, pray and

We started with a small group in October to simply try it out singing Jesse Manibusan's *Hold On to Love*, and were overwhelmed by the emotional response we received from our parish. Having one under our belt, we created a second one for Advent, *On That Holy Mountain*, by Joe Mattingly. Our third video for Christmas combined *O Come All Ye Faithful* and *Joy to the World*. One of my choir members, Josh Derby, who edits the video for us, included pictures of our parish to give our people a sense of home. Aiden Teter, another member of our choir, spent hours mixing the sound for us. We are blessed to have these two skilled people for the audio and video and could not do these without them.

Over the summer when choirs started releasing virtual videos, I must confess that I did not see this as a sustainable or practical way to minister. However, having witnessed the sense of purpose and moments of grace among my choir members, and the deep gratitude from my parish, I am a convert. They take a lot of work and skill to produce a final product, but the rewards are many.

AN ANNIVERSARY TO REMEMBER

Former Chapter Director reflects on the 50th Anniversary of his Senior Organ Recital



I casually flipped the wall calendar to February last month. My mind exploded and my gut knotted up when my roving eyes settled on Sunday, Feb. 14, 2021. Fifty years ago, Sunday, Feb. 14, 1971, was a day destined for potential devastating disappointment.

I awakened early that fateful February Sunday morning in my college dorm room with one question in mind: Had electricity been restored to campus concert hall? Without it, no Feb. 14 organ recital.

I had spent countless hours of grueling practice for this event on the 50-plus-rank Möller instrument in Ogden Hall, which had served many decades as venue for campus and community concerts at Hampton University (formerly Hampton Institute).

I remembered being introduced to that magnificent pipe organ as a summer pre-college student stopping by one day to check out somebody playing. I wasn't the only person - several people surrounded the student and console - turns out they were all upper-class music majors. He was excellent. I conjured up the courage to ask to try it out; he said yes. It was awesome! Afterwards, they asked me what I planned to major in in the fall; I told them French. They looked at me in disbelief; I shrugged. A week later the music department chairman somehow found and summoned me to his office; I entered my freshman year as an organ major.

Over four years, I accompanied our college and concert choirs on that organ for several performances. And I recall *acquiring* a key to the building, so I could practice overnight, sometimes while my then-girlfriend Cora (now spouse) studied close-by using organ console lighting in the darkened hall. Campus security guards knew me by name - and sound.

Now in mid-February 1971, the door to my penultimate performance to fulfill requirements toward my BA degree was blocked because of a building power failure two days before the recital. Work status updates were unreliable then: no cell phones, personal computers or social media. Luckily, I had gotten to practice the Handel concerto with the string quartet the day before the power outage. At least now I didn't have to anguish over squeezing in that last bit of practice before concert day. Still, the wait for word on power restoration weighed heavily.

But thanks be to God, sometime Sunday morning electrical service returned, and the recital could go forward! My mother arrived early that afternoon; my father had to work that day, but I recall running out to hug him as he entered the hall 20 minutes before the concert. I remember the concert start with a Bach choral prelude and the resounding end to Dupré's *Cortege et Litanie*. There was applause; I don't remember my encore. Everything in-between was a blur - I was either in the zone or totally clueless.

My organ professor hosted a reception at her campus residence afterwards. And for a nightcap, Cora and I celebrated Valentine's Day at an Aretha Franklin concert.

The equipment to listen to my reel-to-reel tape recital recording has been long obsolete. But a trusted audio engineer advises me that it can be transferred safely to a modern media device. So maybe by the time you read this, I will have relived concert day - beyond memory.

I'll never ever approach the level of technical facility I achieved half a century ago. But even with meager skills I've retained, I still admire the "King of Instruments." It's *Swell* and *Great*!

MEMBERSHIP, COLLOQUIUM AND CONVENTION:

New Membership Structure for Local and National NPM Members



Historically, national and local chapter memberships of NPM have been separate. People could be members of one without joining the other. This often led to confusion because many assumed that they were automatically enrolled in both.



As of January, this has changed. In keeping with procedures of most professional organizations, registration for the national level now automatically enrolls members in the local chapter that they indicate when signing up.

There are 3 levels of membership: basic, standard, and premium. By going to the NPM website, you can see the benefits of each. The first page details the basic benefits received by all members. The next page, after choosing "get started," lists additional benefits for standard and premium members.

Which one is best for you?

BASIC

Are you a cantor or choir member who likes to keep up to date with what is going on, receive newsletters and reflections, and perhaps attend local offerings? Maybe you are just interested in the basics of music ministry without necessarily being part of the ministry at your church. The \$39 BASIC membership should be perfect for you. This is also a good option for those who feel philanthropic about our organization and want to continue supporting us.

STANDARD

The standard membership is for those who are more invested in planning liturgies, more interested in professional growth opportunities, enjoy receiving *Pastoral Music* magazine, and are likely to want a discount on attending conferences. The STANDARD membership is \$119.

PREMIUM

The premium membership is geared toward those who hold professional music and liturgy positions, and encompasses benefits covered by the former Directors of Music Ministries Division (DMMD). They receive all the above-mentioned benefits, as well as access to more premium content and the colloquium, among other professional events. Cost for the PREMIUM membership is \$169.

We realize there will be a transition time as the new system replaces the old. You might ask how we will handle the cross over. Some local members are still up to date on their dues. Have no fear. Your local chapters will continue to honor those memberships until they expire, at which time we encourage you to log on to NPM.org to register. ***It is vital that you choose your local chapter in order for us to be notified of your registration and receive a portion of your dues to support local events.***

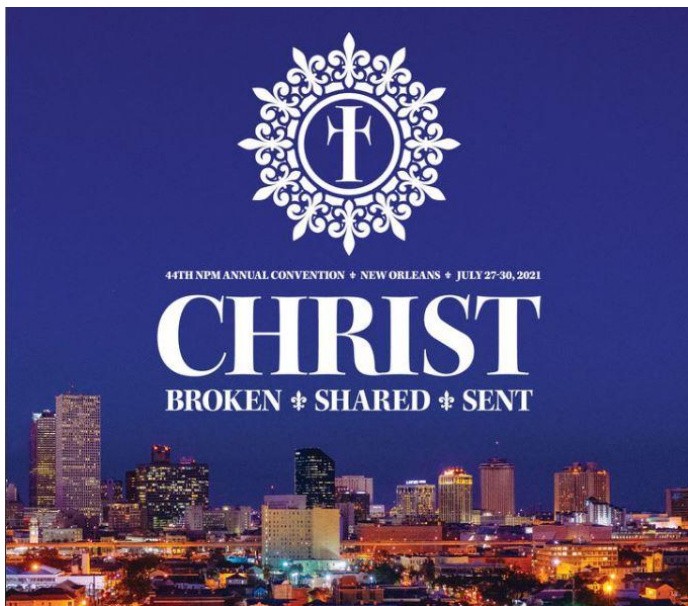
