

NPM Arlington Mass/Dinner Served Up Well Done

Bernadette parish, Springfield, Va. David Mathers, the parish's Director of Sacred Music and Arlington Board Chapter Membership Director, led the Mass choir, complete with him rendering both an organ prelude and postlude. Arlington Diocesan Music Director Fr. Vincent Ferrer Bagan, O.P, celebrated the Eucharist for the occasion.

The Dominican friar, also Director of Music for Arlington's Cathedral of St. Thomas More, surprised the assembly with a Votive Mass in honor of music patroness St. Cecilia on the Church's assigned Sept. 19 Memorial for St. Januarius, bishop and martyr. "I suggested it to David, and it sounded good to him," he explained, illustrating effective liturgy and music coordination. "Both Januarius and Cecilia were like the men and women who accompanied Jesus," he pointed out in his homily, "and they held fast to him and refused to worship the Roman gods." Fr. Bagan found special meaning for pastoral musicians from the short three verses that comprised the Mass's St. Luke Gospel. There, Jesus' followers sensed he offered them a connection to God and salvation "in a way



that no one else could," Fr Bagan said. They wanted to be with him, to listen to his saving words. "We not only listen to the words Jesus speaks to us, we also clothe them in beauty," Fr. Bagan preached to the assembly. "We join that with the musical gifts God has given us to make the beauty of the word manifest in sound. This is a great gift that can keep us close to Jesus." But he warned gatherers about the added work needed to overcome distractions that can keep the faithful from getting close to the words of Jesus. "As musicians, we are the Marthas of the liturgy," he said. "We have to be busy about many liturgical



elements while the Marys in the pews can simply sit at the feet of Jesus." He encouraged congregants to "make sure we build into our lives sufficient Mary time – sufficient time to be with Jesus and simply to listen to his word." Fr. Bagan petitioned pastoral musicians to ask St. Cecilia "to pray for us...that our work as musicians will help us to relish the beauty of the sound words of our Lord Jesus Christ, to relish the beauty of the Word who is our Lord Jesus Christ, so that we will cling closely to him, who alone can save us."

Chapter Director Tim Lewicki said 41 paid registrants came to the dinner following Mass. Attendees included Dr. Rick Gibala, retired predecessor of Fr. Bagan and founding

Arlington NPM Chapter Director; Tom Stehle, Pastoral Associate for Liturgy and Director of Music, Cathedral of St. Matthew the Apostle, Archdiocese of Washington; and Tom Schafer, retired St. Bernadette parish Director of Music. Others included Dr. Elaine Rendler, professor of music at George Mason University and head of music ministry, St. Agnes parish, Shepherdstown, West Va.; and Dianne Yendry, NPM DC Chapter Board secretary and Director of Music and Liturgy, St. Mary's Catholic Church & Shrine of Our Lady of Fatima, Barnesville, Md. First-time attendees included Janet Munford,

Director of Music, Holy Family parish, Dale City, Va., and Jeffrey Corry, Director of the Gospel Choir, St. Joseph parish, Alexandria, Va.

But this year's attendees who traveled the farthest distance were Kevin and Ann Margaret Ward, visiting from Santa Clara, Calif. Their daughter, Nerissa Ward, is a pastoral musician at two Arlington Diocese parishes (Good Shepherd near Mount Vernon, Va., and Old Town Alexandria's St. Joseph). She also sings in the Arlington Diocesan Choir, directed by Fr. Bagan. She said her family's home parish is St. Clare Assisi in Santa Clara, and that her hometown is "down the street from Levi's Stadium, home of the 49ers" profootball team.



Dinner was provided and served by caterer Ben Robles and staff, and Rick Gibala brought his signature homemade desserts.
